

Dear Friends: In an effort to expand the appeal of our newsletter, we have decided to add a "Letters to the Editor" column. Your questions, comments and concerns or anything you want to talk about is acceptable. We will try to answer or get answers and publish them here. Letters must be signed but your name won't be published if you so request. Letters may need to be edited to meet space requirements.

Ursula Hamann writes to beginners in response to FIRSTCUT February 1991:

I think I can speak for all of us when I say we will help you in any way possible when you learn the art of papercutting. I would like to add: Please, do not rely on other artists' designs and patterns to become a papercut artist, or any artist for that matter! Stand on your own "two feet," even if you feel unsure at first. Do not use crutches. You could never join an art association as a beginner expecting anyone to hand you a "Paint by Number" canvas. You take lessons, teach yourself, practice and read. But first of all, beginners should have the basic ingredients, talent and imagination. To that add a great amount of determination, courage and patience. Be kind to yourself, allow time for those first baby steps, if necessary. First attempts do not always live up to expectations, not even for a pro. Learn from mistakes, and understand when looking at great work in an exhibit, others too were beginners once! If you enjoy copying from patterns and still like to be a member of an art group, perhaps we should find a way to fit you into a separate category. This is one of the reasons why I prefer "Papercut-Artist" to "Paper-cutter."

Some Further Thoughts from Steve Woodbury: I agree with Ursula that the way to learn is to just start cutting, applying your own talent and creativity. But I'm less ready to tell a beginner not to use crutches. Some of us aren't initially that sure of our talent and creativity, especially when intimidated by some of the wonderful cuttings we see in books and shows. I guess I was lucky: I started cutting without many models (except a couple of Claudia Hopf's books) so I was very happy with my modest efforts. As a beginner I did copy printed designs, and then I copied bits and pieces and motifs and combined them in new ways. I copied by xerox, and then I copied by eye. And I don't apologize. In addition, for those papercutters who see their work as growing from folk art traditions, it is very important to absorb some of these traditions.

BUT -- two very large "buts". First, it is completely inappropriate to claim a copied design as your own (it's also illegal in most cases, but that's a subject for another article). Second, from the beginning I also cut original designs (very simple), and my goal was always to be independent of any "crutches".

So I <u>would</u> encourage beginners to use crutches (or "training wheels") if they feel the need. But seek out those sources of instruction and inspiration that reflect authentic folk traditions or excellent original design. (I'm afraid that many commercial pattern books don't measure up.) Use these to help train your eyes and your hands; then leave them behind as soon as possible, and set out on your own!

The BIRTHDAY CALENDAR project seems to be hanging heavy over our heads. A great deal of preliminary work was done by Pat Young and her committee and was presented at the Doylestown meeting last year. It was decided the final size and shape of the calendar would be similar to those in the Metropolitan Museums's catalog. That is about 5 x 20 inches, spiral bound on the short top side.

We have one quote from a "Big City" printer that comes to about \$5 per calendar when we order 1000 pieces. (If you are interested in all the details of print colors etc. come to the meeting.) But it suffices to say that each cutting will be reproduced in only one color. This is especially important to remember if you usually paint your pieces or use several colored

At the last general meeting we discussed the specifics of works to be used. Each cutting should be square and targeted to a specific month. The printer will reduce to final size directly from the cutting. Therefore, no

photography step is required.

Mail your cutting to Dorene Rhoads at 315 Ridge Rd., Annville, PA 17003 or bring it to the May meeting. We will, as a group, choose one piece judged the "Guild's Best" -- so noted and guaranteed to be included in the calendar. The remaining choices will be made by an independent judge.

The logistics of producing the calendar are manageable. But paying for it may be a different issue. When the calendars are actually sold at retail outlets, it is doubtful that we could get more than \$12 - \$15 each. Assuming a \$5 cost plus profit for the retailer -- be that member or store -- there isn't a great deal of money left for GAP profit. Maybe that is OK. Maybe the PR value of the work will be worth it to the organization. But we need to talk about it.

Also consider a \$5000 cost to the GAP which has only about \$2500 in the treasury. Perhaps the Guild should put up some money and those wishing to sell would pay up front for some number of calendars. Perhaps we could find a shop that would be willing to pay for tasteful advertising somewhere in the piece. I am also researching foundations in Maryland (because that's where I live...) that might be supportive of the art...

As it is not a specifically dated piece, it might not be a bad idea to have the entire calendar ready for production and then use it to find a

"buyer" -- perhaps a legitimate publisher of such things.

US POSTAGE STAMP DESIGNS - Information is being developed on the procedure needed to follow to have a GAP design considered by the Postal Service. The process requires about seven years.

STICKERS AND BUTTONS - Information is on the way to have GAP stickers available for your artworks. GAP buttons to wear at shows etc. are also being developed. Information on price and availability will be in a future "FIRSTCUT."



Elfwyn's Saga, David Wisniewski, Lothrop, Lee and Shephard Books, N.Y. 1990, \$13.95, reviewed by Sukey Harris.

<u>Elfwyn's Saga</u> is a book for all ages about contrasts: dreams and dissatisfactions, evil and good, hate and love, blindness and vision, the seen and the unseen.

Each 9 x 10-1/2 inch page of the book opens to reveal a centerfold picture 9 x 21 inches, the size of the original cutting. Colored Chromo Rama papers are intricately cut with an X-Acto knife. The cuttings show very fine details such as lines on knuckles and around eyes, the hairs of a beard, or the trim of a sleeve.

The papers were scored, bent or multilayered, then adhered with photo mountings. Superb photography and lighting allow the cuttings to cast dramatic shadows, giving a vigorous visual perception of depth and action to each page. Through color and cutting techniques, each picture imparts its unique feeling of action or calmness, anger or love, joy or sadness, flight or security.

This is a "must-have" for artist/cutters and collectors.

Quilts and Papercuts Elly Sienkiewicz wrote over a year ago, and her letter has been languishing in your former President's in-box; it's still worth sharing.

I am a recent member of the Papercutters' Guild. Perhaps other Guild Members may share my particular interest—or just be intrigued by it. I am a historian and quiltmaker, author of two books on the mid—nineteenth century Baltimore Album Quilts and working on my third. I have always loved papercuts and it may be a reason why I find the Baltimore Album Quilts so fascinating. Many applique blocks in these quilts may show a strong scherenschnitte influence, plausible because of the hundreds of Germans who immigrated through the port of Baltimore in the decades 1840—1850, coming here on the same boats which shipped cotton and tobacco to Europe.

Baltimore Beauties and Beyond, Studies in Classic Album Quilt Applique, Volume I shows full color photos of both classic Baltimore Album Quilts with papercut blocks and, in contemporary quilt #8, many blocks in this style which are my original designs. These include houses, kangaroos, cats, and cupids, papercut and then appliqued in cotton. "Cutwork applique" is particularly suited to presenting papercuts in fabric and is taught in lessons 1 and 2 in Baltimore Beauties, I. The book is available from me at \$23.95 (176 pages, pb) or \$39.95 (hb) plus \$3.00 shipping. Members might also be interested in my first book, Spoken Without a Word, which is not only on the Baltimore Album Quilts but contains a dictionary of hundreds of flowers and other symbols used by Victorian quiltmakers—and undoubtedly papercutters. It is \$16.95 (pb) plus \$3.00 shipping.

<u>Volume III</u> of <u>Baltimore Beauties</u> is due out in early 1991 and will focus on papercut applique with multiple spectacular Album Quilts done in this style.

Sukey Harris and Kerch McConlogue will each have cuttings pictured in the August issue of Early American Life magazine.






FROM INTERSTATE 70 - From Baltimore or Washington...Take first Hagerstown exit (Route 40 West) and proceed into town. Turn left on Prospect Street and go three blocks. Turn right into the City Park.

FROM INTERSTATE 81 FROM THE NORTH (PENNSYLVANIA): Take Route 40 East exit and proceed into town. Turn right on Prospect Street and go two blocks. Turn right into the City Park.

FROM INTERSTATE 81 FROM THE SOUTH OR INTERSTATE 70 FROM THE WEST Proceed on Interstate 81, north toward Harrisburg. Take the Halfway Boulevard exit and bear
right. Go past Valley Mall and to intersection of Route 11 (Virginia Avenue) and turn left. Stay on
Virginia Avenue until City Park appears on your left. At traffic circle, go carefully around and enter
the City Park.

PICNIC AREA...

Enjoy your picnic lunch in the City Park adjacent to the Washington County Museum. The park contains formal gardens, a fully equipped recreational area, fireplaces and complete picnic facilities. It features a natural spring-fed lake abounding with fish, ducks, geese and swans.
