From the most intricate and detailed cuttings of Merilee Otttenbacher's "Avian Affection"Phoenix, AZ, to the bold and imaginative "Shear Variety" of Kerch McConlogue, Baltimore MD, the twenty-one piece Shear Variety Show is certainly just that. Don't miss it.

Attractively hung and well lighted, it is an excellent representation of sizes, styles, creativity, papers, form and color. The Bedford Gallery "Peoples Choice" award of $\$ 100$ went to Walter Von Gunten, York, PA, for his exquisitely detailed intricate "Flower Maiden," which was sold at the Somerset Dressler Arts Center showing.'
Sharon Schaich's "Flying Geese,", Lititz, PA, an innovative outstanding collage, uses a variety of papers, tiny beads, and gold threads to form a quilt-like pattern. Very detailed patterns are provided, as well as charts of appropriate colors. Included with the book are 11 sheets of colored glazed paper. ## Illustrated Children's Books Colored Paper Collage

Cut paper collage illustration encompasses a wide range of styles. While we cannot reproduce the color illustrations in the pages of FirstCut, we can review at least a sampling of recent books, and urge you to look for them at your library or bookstore.

On the Day You Were Born, by Debra Frasier. A celebration of the natural world, in full-page collages. Written for a child, each page represents some aspect of the natural world "on the day you were born." Five pages at the back of the book present more information about the subjects (such as migrating animals, the sun and moon, tides, rain, trees, air). A lovely gift for a child. Debra Frasier has worked for many years with Artist-in-Education programs designing projects that combine natural history with the visual arts; this is her first picture book. Shoes from Grandpa, by Mem Fox, illustrated by Patricia Mullins. Grandpa offers to buy Jessie a new pair of shoes, and everyone else in the family offers something else to go with them. Everything but what Jessie really wants: a new pair of jeans. A cumulative story, along the lines of The House That Jack Built, this is sure to appeal to children. The illustrations are softedged torn collage of various tissue and translucent papers.

Growing Wild, Inviting Wildlife Into Your Yard, by Constance Perenyi. The images in Growing Wild are collages of cut and torn paper. Very effective use is made of textured and translucent papers. Constance Perenyi has a degree in Art, as well as certification in Bird Biology from Cornell; she conducts workshops to teach children her crafted paper techniques. Besides being a truly beautiful book, Growing Wild provides inspiration and advice on how to provide wildlife habitat in your own backyard. Making Tracks, by Steven Savage. An interesting concept for a mechanical book, somewhat plainly executed. Each page has a simple background of paper cut/collage in three or four colors, with a slide-out tab. As you pull the tab, tracks appear through the die-cut holes, and the animal responsible appears in a cut-out panel. Unfortunately, the die cutting does not accurately reproduce the animal's track, so some of the point is lost. [Lodestar Books (Dutton), 1992, 10 pp, ISBN 0-525-67353-9, \$10.00.]

How the Animals Got Their Colors, by Michael Rosen, illustrated by John Clementson. This collection of animal myths from around the world is illustrated in bold, bright-colored, angular collages. Artist John Clementson lives in London; he studied art at Carlisle Art College and Wolverhampton Polytechnic. [Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, San Diego, 1992, 48 pp., ISBN 0-15-236783-7, \$14.95.]

Clip Art for Year A, released just this month, is an extraordinary book - even if the stunning artworks were pen and inks. They are not. Over 500 papercuttings by the incomparable contemporary cutter, Brother Steve Erspamer, S.M., a Marist monk from St. Louis, Missouri, are featured in this collection. In all my years I have never come across such striking, powerful images in cut paper, and never seen such consistently pure designing. I find it nearly impossible to put this book down. And when I do, it is such a pleasure to pick it back up and study it all over again. Steve's designs remind me of the old woodcuts that we all remember from the 50 s and 60 s. All the illustrations from this book are inspired from Scripture. However, I doubt if you have ever seen Scripture translated so uniquely! ## "Polish Paper Cut Art" cuttings by Elzbieta Kaleta at the Paul VI Institute for the Arts in Washington DC.

Let me confess right at the start: I've been a big fan of Elzbieta's cuttings since I first saw them, and met her, in Albuquerque a couple of years ago. Her cuttings reflecting her Polish heritage in a variety of traditional styles are beautiful. Her cuttings inspired by her new home in New Mexico, whether based on prehistoric pottery designs from the Mimbres Valley, or on the desert plants and animals around her, are stunningand absolutely unique. The interaction and crossfertilization of these two traditions has led to something more than the sum of the parts. In the most "un-Polish" Southwestern cuttings there resonates an unmistakable echo of traditional Polish styles.

Take, for example, the tree of life motif. In Poland, the single color "leluja," with a single fold and usually a central treelike form with one or more pairs of roosters or other birds, is typical of the Kurpie region (north of Warsaw). The show includes several beautiful leluja in red or black. Some feature Elzbieta's lifelike animals. Two "tree of life" cuttings depict the crucifixion and are laden with Christian symbolism.

And then, from New Mexico, we wee another singlefold tree of life cut from black paper, with angular branches and stylized figures based on Mimbres pottery motifs.

Or take the "Gwiazda" or star. In the Kurpie region, these are cut from a single color paper folded to repeat 8,16 , or 32 times. Gwiazdy from the Lowicz region (west of Warsaw), usually have a single fold, with multiple layers of colored paper added to the black background. They typically depict flowers and a brightfeathered rooster. Included in the show are traditional multicolored gwiazdy with roosters or peacocks.

Both forms have also been adapted to Southwestern
motifs. Several of the Southwestern-inspired designs use multiple-fold circular symmetry in a single color. "Kokopelli's Song" has multiple colors, in muted desert tones; its birds and flowers have a single-fold symmetry except for the traditional figure of Kokopelli, the flute player, in the center. "Tawa" is a circle of feathers, in multiple layers of color, with the center a stylized Indian face or mask.

Another traditional Polish motif is the "forest" cutting: a single color with perhaps six vertical folds and three horizontal levels, cut with repeated trees, human figures and animals. One example in the show includes lifelike deer and boars and squirrels among the trees. This traditional Polish form is transported to the Southwest in "On the Mesa" with yucca and other desert plants, birds and mule deer, in a limited palette of tones from native pottery.
"Kodry" cuttings have a long horizontal axis; they either feature fantastic decorative flowers and birds, or realistically portray various activities or ceremonies of peasant life. Several Polish scenes are included; my favorite is an elaborate collage of "Christmas Eve," with bright costumes and wrapped presents. The family has decorated their home with garlands and scattered the floor with straw. There is a small nativity scene, and even elaborate papercuts on the walls. "Nacimiento" also depicts a nativity scene, also in native costumethough this time Indian blankets-cut in desert hues from beige to umber.

Many of the more elaborate Mimbres-inspired cuttings don't have a direct Polish counterpart. They are often asymmetrical (or at least do not have mirror symmetry). One of my favorites,"Cranes and Corn," offers a dynamic contrast between the angular, highly stylized corn motif marching up the center, and the equally stylized and fantastic cranes with their round bodies and curved and recurved necks.
Perhaps Elzbieta's bold crossover art is epitomized in "White Sands Dunes." Inside a round wavy stylized dune motif in black and white is a circular, highly stylized, rattlesnake in black and gray. And in the center, a stylized cactus in jagged green, with a red and orange cactus flower in a burst of Polish color.
lot has been written in this quincentenary year about the profound impacts, good and bad, of the contact of American and European cultures following Columbus' voyage. The Smithsonian, in last summer's Folklife Festival and an exhibit in the Museum of American History, has traced some of the continuity and the intermingling in New Mexico of Hispanic and "Anglo" and native cultures. Elzbieta's art is yet another facet of this American kaleidoscope.

## Film Review

The film DAN PAULOS: A Seeing Heart is monumental in its dealings with Catholicism, the Madonna in religious art, the Holocaust, and the impact other artists and celebrities have had on this artist's life. Through his own narrations he invites each viewer to share in the friendships with his mentors and contemporaries, selflessly presenting examples of their artistic gifts along with his own. Paulos credits Joan Baez for making him aware of those who suffer in our midst. It is powerfully fitting, then, that Joan agreed to perform four "hymns" - if you will - which movingly blend Dan's artistry with his vision. Actress, Rosemary Harris, dramatically give witness to her friendship with Paulos, and interprets his classic drawing, "The Madonna of the Slaughtered Jews." She sensitively combines two additional segments about the Holocaust, featuring actual film footage and photos from the concentration camps. Interviews with Paulos' parents, grandmother, and friends offer a rare insight into the heart of one of America's best loved silhouettists. The viewing of this video will be an unforgettable experience.

## Membership Report

Last year at this time GAP had about 145 members. At that time we set a goal of 200 members to be reached by January 1,1993 . We're happy to report that we now expect to have between 215 and 220 members by January 1. Congratulations to all of you for forwarding the names of those who were interested and joined. As the membership grows, the meetings, newsletter, shows and all of the GAP activities will continue to become more valuable to all members.
We had planned to list all of the new members in this report, but the list would be too long. Future membership lists will include the initial membership date for those members who joined after mid-1992. We suggest that you review the right side of the membership list to see the names of those in or near your zip code. See the little article on "GAP networking" in this newsletter for what to do next.
In mid-1992 there was a change in dues for new members only. Rather than $\$ 15$, new members are required to pay $\$ 21$, the extra one-time cost of $\$ 5$ to defray the costs of the initial membership package that costs the Guild about $\$ 9$ to put together. The new member package includes ten stickers (\$1), a Guild lapel pin (\$6), and a large amount of written material. The total package costs almost $\$ 2$ to mail. Those new members who paid $\$ 15$ did not receive the Guild pin. They may order it at the regular price of $\$ 6$. The annual membership rate of $\$ 15$ has not been changed and continues to apply to all existing members.

The geographical spread of members now includes 43 states and three countries other than the USA. All

members now belong to the Guild and to the Middle Atlantic Chapter. The board believes that this is a good time to begin to encourage regional meetings with the intent that at some time in the future, regional chapters will be formed. We need Mexican and Central American members to fulfill our intent of being the Guild for all cutters in North America. If you have any contacts with any from those areas, please pass their names to Dick Harris. Mexico, especially, has a rich heritage of papercutting and we would all benefit by learning more about the types of cutting done in that area.

I found a couple of new tools at my local crafts store which may be of interest to paper cutters:

SCISSORS - Clover makes scissors with a wavy edge (No. 443/R), as well as with a zig-zag edge (like pinking shears) (No. 442/B). The handles are plastic; the stainless steel blades make about a 1.5 inch cut. About $\$ 15.00$. (Clover Needlecraft, Inc., Carson CA 90746)

PAPER PUNCH - Gem paper punches are available with hole shapes in addition to round. No. 9021 is a heart shape, and No. 9022 a $1 / 8$ inch diamond. About \$3.50. (McGill, Inc., Marengo IL 60152) Steve Woodbury

CALENDAR - Matisse PaperCuttings: Vibrant and Exciting, Pep-up your year; about $\$ 14.00$ at good book stores.

1916 GERMAN SCHERENSCHNITTE DESIGNS - A portfolio of ten scherenschnitte designs dating from 1916 is being offered for sale by Miss Iby Siemens of Montreal.

Dan Paulos has been cutting paper since he was a child, but wasn't serious about it until 1985 . His mentor and teacher, American born scissorist, Sister Mary Jean Dorcy, had been cutting since the early 1930s. When acute arthritis crippled her, she began to prod Dan to "take over" her style.
In 1974, Paulos began designing silhouettes and painstakingly painting them with acrylics, each taking up to three months to complete. The experience of painting for ten years in black and white prepared him for the transition of cutting his silhouettes from a single piece of paper.
"Religious artists are as scarce as hens' teeth," Sister Jean often told him. Thus, Paulos restricts his papercuttings to spiritual images, concentrating mostly on the healing power of motherhood, tenderly portrayed through his Madonnas.
He draws each design on tracing film, then transferring them onto the white side of the silhouette paper. He always starts his silhouettes by first cutting the profiles. There is no rhyme or reason for this custom other than he loves cutting profiles. He cuts them and
all outside lines with scissors. For inside lines he uses razor blades or honed X -acto 11 s .
Paulos first used the Wiss 766 scissors that Sister Mary Jean Dorcy used for thirty-five years. They're now retired, and though he ordered a new pair form Wiss, he prefers and now exclusively uses Ghingers from Brazil.
According to respected calligraphers and book binders, Elmer's School Glue is the best adhesive for mounting paper to paper. Dan now uses this glue, thinned with distilled water. With the tip of an X-acto blade, he lifts small area of the papercutting, and uses a very fine artist brush to apply small amounts of glue to the delicate lines. He always uses four-ply rag board for mounting.
Dan's cutting and serigraphs are found throughout the world courtesy of the Catholic Church. His Mother Teresa book has been translated and published in Japanese, and the Vatican recently released an Italian version. Dan is working on two new books, both autobiographical accounts of his experiences with the Church and Art.
A one-hour video written by Joseph Bean is being released in January of 1993 covering Dan's life and art. And his small mail order business continues to carry books, ceramic tiles, cards, prints and serigraphs of his work. At the end of 1993, Paulos promises to retire from papercutting, returning to oil painting after nearly a twenty-five year absence. His friends are all betting that it'll never happen.
