All that said, the forced time away from the studio and any sort of socializing gave me some time to really delve into myself. I was forced to accept that being sick was out of my control, and if I pushed myself it was only going to get worse. This past few weeks were frustrating, but also allowed the space for my brain to shut off and take in some thoughtful creative exploration.

Pair that space with reading the book, Trauma Stewardship (If any of y'all are caregivers in literally any capacity, I highly recommend reading this book), which focuses a lot on intentionality in the work you do. Combined, I was able to ring the new year in with a sense of clarity and inspiration.

As an artist who is very process-oriented, I can often become overwhelmed by the desire to create and neglect setting a clear intention prior to setting up in the studio. This often results in feeling flustered because my art isn't as personal as I'd like it to be, or because I'm not pushing the boundaries of my practice. Heading into 2019, one of my goals is to slow down and ground myself before working, while also practicing radical self-acceptance. If I have a hankering just to create, to do it, without judgment, and not put pressure on myself to create a masterpiece. A week in and it's so far, so good. I'm crossing my fingers that I can...

First Cut Member Profile:

SUZI ZIMMERER

Suzi Zimmerer of Louisville, Kentucky cuts paper, but also works in all kinds of media including relief printing, painting, drawings with all kinds of mediums, work in 3D, dioramas, or little finger puppets and dolls. And, of course, she says: "I am sure there are many things I have yet to discover!" For her cuts, she prefers an X-Acto #11, but also tears paper, creates stencils, creates mono-prints, and employes Mod-podge, Elmer's, or gel mediums to create collages. In fact, Suzi seems to enjoy doing anything and everything that can be done to, on, or with paper! She loves "drawing and cutting paper, drawing ON cut paper, EVERY combination, really." While much of her collage work uses images from books and other printed materials, she has also been known to incorporate her own photographs.

Suzi began cutting paper as a child. Her mother would cut characters out of paper while telling Suzi stories. In art school, Suzi continued her mother's practice by cutting her own characters to amuse herself and the other students. It's no doubt that her mother's cutting contributed to her visual thinking. "My brain is always churning ideas for visuals, for story." For more than 40 years Suzi has kept notebooks of thoughts, sketches, quotes and snippets of all kinds. She can find inspiration anywhere including literature, nature, theatre, dance, archaeology, history, and science.

For 30 years Suzi has shown her work in museums, galleries, and libraries in Germany, England, and across the US but now finds herself "retreating" from showing stating that "...so much time is absorbed by techy detail and bookkeeping, which is not for me!" but also notes that she expects to have a "modest" web-presence soon. In addition to being a GAP member, Suzi is a member of Louisville Area Fiber and Textile Artists.

Andrea Martin is a Saint Paul artist and educator. She has been cutting paper for ten years and started working as a full time artist after retiring from teaching science. Andrea exhibits her work at art fairs and exhibitions regionally, nationally, and internationally. She belongs to several art organizations including MN Center for Book Arts, the Weaver's Guild of Minnesota, the Surface Design Association and is the past president of the Guild of American Papercutters. andrearmartin.com

Vera Ming Wong is a natural science illustrator, artist, & educator. She is the director & founder of Project Art for Nature (MN & WI), a member of the Guild of Natural Science Illustrators and What We Need Is Here Artists Group. Vera's artworks and illustrations focus on native plants, animals, and fungi, their ecosystems and habitats. Her illustrations have appeared in various publications since 1988, including "Minnesota's Endangered Flora and Fauna"; "Northwoods Wildlife"; "Orchids of Minnesota" & "North Shore, Minnesota's Superior Coast." In decades of exploring cut paper, Vera has created images in collage, multi-layered cut paper, cut paper in 2- and 3-dimensions, and cut paper mixed-media. She also translates cut paper pieces into metal sculptures or large-scale murals.


