Papercut Cards: Christmas, Hanukkah and Kwanzaa

Papercutting is an ancient art dating back to the creation of paper during the 1st century in China. Since that time, artisans have used paper, scissors and knives to create objects both ornamental and functional. Perhaps you made a snow flake in grade school or have seen silhouettes. These are forms of papercutting. In this workshop, you create holiday cards. I bring templates or you can design your own. You learn how to cut with an exacto knife and how to see negative and positive space. Students create holiday cards suitable for reproduction. You can chose a particular holiday or make cards for all three.



"Places in Paper" Amazes Arlington By Melanie Kehoss

Fifteen GAP members made the trek to Virginia on October 12 for the opening reception of "Places in Paper". I relished hosting my talented friends in Arlington, where we also enjoyed an art-themed restaurant, local brews, an envelope-stuffing party, and of course a papercutting session. Board members delivered plenty of ideas and action plans at our annual in-person board meeting. Immediately afterwards, we went into PR mode, sharing information about GAP and peddling prints, cards, and art at the reception.

The reaction to the exhibit has been phenomenal. Many visitors report that "Places in Paper" is the best exhibit they have seen at Gallery 3700. Gallery director Joan Lynch calls the exhibit "a cut above" (pun intended in true GAP fashion). Emotions range from disbelief (that Richard Goodall's Saint Chapelle model is really made of paper) to delight (at June Gengler's cows) to surprise (that Damain Shaab's "Cathedral of St. Paul" packs so much detail in such a small piece). Discussions at the reception included whether Vera Ming Wong's "Above the Prairie" is laser cut (it is not) and how beautifully Bianca Levan presents her miniature landscapes. It has been a great pleasure to showcase the immense talent and creativity of GAP members with my community, and I would be happy to share my experience with any member considering organizing an exhibit in their home town!
